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Introducing the new Logo

The Learning Disabilities Association of Canada (LDAC) approved this new design in July 2008. It was adopted earlier this year by Learning Disabilities Association of Ontario (LDAO) in an effort to use a single brand and style.

What does the logo mean? The definition of the logo, corresponding to the three outer components of the logo, is as follows:

Collaboration - Many people working together to support and accommodate

Potential - Helping people lift off and achieve

Hope - Optimism, aiming high and working with passion.

The new logo succeeds on all three fronts.

The English name remains the same – this is an association of Canadians committed to a single focus – Learning Disabilities.

In French, the name changes to *Association* canadienne des troubles d'apprentissage

The icon conveys a sense of many people collaborating to support an individual; though diverse (employers, educators, parents, etc.), they are united in the task. The colours and the font of the new brand are clean, fresh and optimistic. This is a modern,

forward-looking design that conveys how dynamic and innovative we are.

LDAC works to protect the rights of people with LD to learn, while empowering them – through support and accommodations/strategies to achieve their full potential as learners, employees and citizens.

Answer

The Ministry seems to have finally returned to its agenda from the Special Education Transformation document and is "rolling out" pieces that were included in that document. I believe this is good news for Special Education students. In the past few days there have been announcements about the new Report Card coming in the next year, now the Parent Engagement Office is actively soliciting input into its newly released draft policy, "Parents in Partnership- a Parent Engagement Policy for Ontario Schools" which is available at

I recognize the need for the Ministry to "speak nice", so as not to offend educators and school boards, but I find the draft document paints a "too-rosy" picture of schools embracing parents and working side-by-side with them. While this does happen in some schools and even generally in some boards, I hear from many parents and community professional that they are not being "engaged" by the schools that they work with!!!!!!

There is a strong sentiment in the Special Education community that a lot of knowledge and expertise

is being ignored and that a significant number of parents and professionals feel "shut out of the club" simply because they are not "teachers".

In "Special Education Transformation" the Ministry promises a greater role for parents and community professionals and states that many educators need training in collaboration----I believe this is still true in schools today. Please be candid about your experiences, both positive and negative---how well are YOU being engaged?

"Just Do It....."

Obviously, "Parent Engagement" applies to all parents and communities, NOT JUST Special Education--- but we need to be heard because Partnerships between school and parents (and community professionals) are ABSOLUTELY critical in making the system work for exceptional pupils.
